NOTE 1 BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards under the Department of Health and Human Services (the Schedule) includes the federal grant activity of Klein Buendel, Inc. (the Company) under programs of the federal government for the year ended December 31, 2024. The information in the Schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 45 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 75, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for HHS Awards and Audit Requirements for U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Awards.* Because the Schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of the Company, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, changes in net position, or cash flows of the Company. Pass-through entity identifying numbers are presented where available.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Expenditures reported in the Schedule are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. NIH fees are awarded under Small Business Innovation Research/Small Business Technology Transfer programs. These fees are not a cost, but are an amount in excess of actual allowable direct and indirect costs. In accordance with normal commercial practice, a profit/fee may be paid to a contractor under an NIH grant providing routine goods or services to the recipient.
